Poisons First Aid

Call NHS 111 for advice Call 999 for severe symptoms

Eyes

- 1. Rinse with water for 10-15 mins
- 2. Don't put anything else in the eye
- 3. Call NHS 111*

Inhalation

- 1. Call 999 if there is difficulty breathing
- 2. Go outside for fresh air
- 3. Ventilate the property (open windows)
- 4. Call NHS 111*

Skin

- 1. Take off contaminated clothing
- 2. Rinse the skin with water for 10-15 mins
- 3. Call NHS 111*

Swallowing

- 1. Call 999 if choking occurs or there is difficulty breathing
- 2. Never induce someone to vomit, this can cause harm
- 3. Call NHS 111*
- 4. Keep any product packaging and labels

Low risk items

(Call NHS 111 if there are any symptoms or if a large amount is swallowed)

- Craft items, children's paint, glitter
- Toys (including the liquid inside)
- Ice packs (for cooling food/drinks)
- Mouldy food
- Soap, shower gel, shampoo and washing up liquid
- Contraceptive pill, HRT
- Creams (sudocrem), moisturiser
- Wipes
- Vitamins B, C, E
- Nappies
- Animal faeces
- Grass, soil
- Silica gel

Call 999 if your child is:

- Unconscious
- Has difficulty breathing
- Swallowed a button battery
- Experiencing any burns (fire or chemical)

Dangers

- Button batteries
- Multiple magnets
- Carbon monoxide
- Liquitabs (Concentrated washing detergent)
- Common Salt (excess)
- Concentrated essential oils
- Oven cleaner, concentrated descaler
- Cigarettes, E-cig liquid and vapes
- Any medication
- Paracetamol (including Calpol)
- Multivitamins (Iron, vitamin A)
- Illicit drugs
- Alcohol
- Antifreeze
- Rat, insect and weedkillers
- Snakebite (Adder)
- Wild mushrooms
- Some berries or plants



Corrosive items can cause significant harm if swallowed, in eyes or on the skin.
